FROM THE PRINCIPAL

Dear Parents and Community Members,

The annual report card issued by the Oregon Department of Education offers a comprehensive picture of how Monroe High School and its students are doing compared with all other high schools in the state. While this report does not portray a complete picture of all the things we do here at Monroe, it does reflect the effort and work that both our staff and students put into learning and achieving.

In the 2016-17 school year, Monroe High School received a rating in three areas: Academic Achievement (level 4 of a possible 5), Academic Growth (level 3 of a possible 5), and Graduation (level 4 of a possible 5), showing that our students are performing at a level as well or better on standards-based tests, and graduating at a higher, as students in most other Oregon high schools. **Key academic highlights:**

- 81.0% of our students in the class of 2018 met or exceeded state standards for English/Language
 Arts (level 3 or 4 on the Smarter Balanced assessment).
- · 37.1% of our students in the class of 2018 met or exceeded state standards for mathematics (level 3 or 4 on the Smarter Balanced assessment).
- · 85.7% of our current students in the class of 2018 have met the state requirements for Essential Skills in Mathematics, Reading, and Writing (required for graduation)

- · 92% of our current intact senior class have met the state requirements for Essential Skills in Mathematics, Reading, and Writing (required for graduation)
- · Our cohort graduation rate continues to be a level 4 (indicating an above average rate compared with other schools in the state), ranging between 78.8% and 88.9% over the past two years.

Monroe High School will continue to emphasize student learning and growth in relation to meeting state learning standards in all courses. We believe strongly that Monroe High School provides our students with a strong foundation for their future endeavors and we strive to prepare all of our students for success after high school. We have added on half-time teaching position at the high school and have expanded our offerings, specifically focusing on Language Arts. Parents can play an important role in the education of their student at the high school level by monitoring student work and progress and communicating with teaching staff. Student assignments

and progress can be accessed through the Pinnacle Portal available on the Monroe School District website.

SCHOOL READINESS

Monroe High School implements a Freshmen Orientation and Freshman Academy to help prepare students for transitioning to high school.

ACADEMIC SUPPORT

Monroe High School has a full-time high school guidance and college counselor.

Monroe High School has a full-time special education teacher and three full-time special education instructional assistants.

Class sizes are small with an average of sixteen students per class.

Our block schedule includes a daily 45-minute advisory period which enables students to receive individual help and instruction across the curriculum.

Our Student Services Team (SST) meets weekly to develop strategic and focused interventions to assist students in being successful in high school.

Senior Project course is required for graduation to assist and focus post-high school transition plans.

Monroe High School offers a number of career-oriented technical (CTE) courses. For the 2016-17 school year, we have continued to restructure our Computers program and now offer Computer Applications, Desktop Publishing, and Graphic Arts courses which are articulated with Linn-Benton Community College for dual credit. In our Industrial Arts department, Welding 1-4, Woodworking 1-4, Fundamentals of Engineering, and Principles of Technology (Electric Car Program) are offered. Many of these courses are articulated with our Perkins CTE program and dual credits can be earned through Lane Community College.
